HERBERT ARTHUR HOLLIER 1913 - 2012 On July 29, 2012, two weeks after celebrating his 99th birthday with family and friends, Herbert Arthur Hollier passed away at Deer Lodge Centre in Winnipeg. Herb was born in Oak Lake Manitoba, the fifth child of Vincent Oswald Hollier and Sarah Ann Fowell who had emigrated from Leicestershire, England. Growing up during the depression, Herb spent summers as a farm hand in the Oak Lake area, and winters cutting wood and ice. Like many other young men, he rode the boxcars to Vancouver in search of work, but soon returned to Oak Lake where he found work as a butcher's assistant. A natural athlete, he was an enthusiastic and skilled hockey and baseball player. When the war broke out in September 1939, Herb enlisted in the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders of Canada. Knowing that his wife would be guaranteed an army pension, he finally felt able to marry Edna Boyce, also from Oak Lake, on Valentine's Day, 1940. The regiment soon shipped to England to await action in Europe. Showing a natural ability to lead, he rose to the rank of Company Sergeant Major. Mere weeks before the Dieppe Raid, Herb was reassigned to Canada where he spent time on the west coast helping to build coastal defenses before taking part in the American-led expedition against Japan to reoccupy the Aleutian Islands in August, 1943. Edna was able to move to Victoria and Prince Rupert to be near

him. He was then sent back overseas and did not return again to Canada until September, 1945. In peacetime, Herb was hired with the Federal Department of Agriculture as a meat inspector, a job that he carried out with dedication and professionalism for 32 years. He and Edna moved to St. James in August, 1950. It was a neighbourhood with many young families, and the Holliers made several life-long friends on Ferry Road and at the Bourkevale Community Club, where Herb coached hockey and helped to maintain the outdoor rinks. After his retirement in 1977, Herb and Edna enjoyed several winters in Arizona, making a new group of snowbird friends whom they saw annually, until Edna succumbed to heart disease in January, 1988. He had two holes-in-one, and enjoyed golf until almost 90. In winter he kept fit with cross-country skiing and long walks around Assiniboine Park, even in the coldest weather. In 2001 he moved to Metropolitan Kiwanis Courts and remained there until failing mobility forced a move to Deer Lodge. Herb lived according to principles of honesty and duty in everything he did himself, and treated others with respect and regard. *Full obit published in the Winnipeg Free Press on August 04, 2012*

His second book was "Normandy 1944". To quote Fred, "It's brand new but our public loved it and we sold a lot of them; 8000 copies".

He is also the president of an association called "Maple Leaf/Souvenir Canadien". They are planning to make two big plaques for the Canadian soldiers who died in action in Putot-en-Bessin, it should include more than 200 names.

Fred's aim is to serve the Canadian Remembrance.

Special 70th Anniversary of Dieppe Commemorative Service at 1st Presbyterian 19 August 2012

On the Sunday a good sized bunch of us, including a certain Maj. Ken Smith who present on Green Beach some 70 years ago, gathered at Winnipeg's "Presbyterian Cathedral" to remember our second baptism of fire. Here are the speaker's notes:

Good Morning, My name is Hugh O'Donnell & I am the Secretary of The Cameron Association in Canada. The Camerons have been coming to 1st Pres since 1928, but we're not the most regular of churchgoers.

On that note therefore thank you very much to Rev MacDonald & to you ladies & gentlemen of this congregation for hosting us this morning in memory of the 70th Anniversary of the Dieppe Raid. It was formally known as Operation Jubilee.

Several reasons have been given for the mounting of this Raid. Most recently and very intriguingly of the bunch was to capture a brand new 4 disk ENIGMA machine used encode and decode German message traffic from a German Naval HQ supposedly located in Dieppe. The Allies had been reading most German radio message traffic for years but this new 4 disk machine meant an end to all that. Convoys of food, fuel, arms, and troops could no longer be routed safely away from u-boat wolf packs and any Second Front plans would be set back by years.

To find out just how tough it might be to capture a strongly defended port - something thought vital to the success of an Allied invasion landing in occupied Europe, and could it be done quickly enough to avoid the port facilities being demolished?

How well will the latest equipment, tactics, techniques & procedures hold up?

To show the Russians and the Americans just how hopelessly ill prepared the western Allies were to mount a Second Front in 1942 OR 1943 even at the cost of most of an infantry division ?

To capture a German radar set for intelligence exploitation, and to deny the Germans the use of the barges kept safe in the port for a German invasion of England?

The port of Dieppe was a town of some 25,000 in 1942. Dieppe and its surrounding coastal villages of Pourville and Puits have a series of chalk cliffs that rise on each side like giant roller coasters to about the height of the Hudson's Bay store downtown - and these cliffs are just as steep as those walls. The only likely way to capture Dieppe is to take that high ground by landing in the valleys between these heights at Pourville and Puits and take them by attacking up the steeply sloping hill sides.

The Germans were no slouches and these cliffs and sloping hill sides had been fortified with lots of concrete MG bunkers which were protected by barbed wire obstacles. The beaches had been registered as mortar, MG, and artillery targets, as had other targets nearby. More German troops were stationed in the rear areas to quickly attack any Allied troops that managed to get off of the beaches alive. They had also flooded the Scie River valley which cuts Pourville in half and was to be a critical problem to the SSR and Camerons.

The Camerons and their 6th Brigade running mates, The South Saskatchewan Regiment, were to land at Pourville, WEST of Dieppe or to the right of it if you prefer.

The SSR had 2 main jobs. They were to secure Pourville so that the Camerons could land safely & pass through to their tasks, and also to secure

the high ground between Dieppe and Pourville which towers over the Dieppe beaches. If the Germans still held that high ground when the RHLI and Essex Scottish landed things would go badly indeed. That same high ground was also to be the road to the pick up boats and the safe way back to England. The SSR were also to capture a nearby radar station, its radar set, and other security related tasks.

The Camerons were to land and make straight for the Bois Vertus crossroads near Petite Appeville. There the Camerons were to link up with the Calgary Tanks coming off of the main beach then attack the nearby airfield. Should time and circumstances permit they were also to attack the suspected site of a German Division's HQ at Arques la Battaile then withdraw to Dieppe and get on the boats for home. All in a day's work.

On the evening of 18 Aug 1942 The Camerons, some 503 strong & bringing along with them some American Rangers, left the English port of Newhaven as part of the 2nd Cdn Division to take part in the cross channel Raid on the French port of Dieppe.

The Navy landed the SSR at 0452 hrs but fatally for the plan almost half of them were landed on the wrong side of the Scie River. As a result surprise and time were lost and they were only partly able to secure the Pourville beachhead area before the Camerons set down. The SSR were not able to make significant progress in taking the high ground overlooking the main beaches and clearing the route to Dieppe - the planned evacuation beach - despite V.C. winning efforts and tremendous sacrifice by all ranks.

The Camerons had been scheduled to land at 0520 hrs 19 Aug 1942 in a mostly secure beachhead. The CO deliberately delayed the landing until 0550 hrs to allow the SSR extra time to get their part of the show on the road. It was during this delay that the CO had Alex Graham play his pipes to keep the morale of the men in a fighting state while bullets and bombs were splashing around them. It is reported that the Company pipers also played for their men too. At 0550 The Camerons landed under fire. As with the SSR the Camerons were not landed entirely in the correct place. The Cameron CO was killed by MG fire from one of those bunkers within minutes of setting foot on the beach.

Capt. Young of Wpg's Ravenscourt School fame, and about a company of Camerons who were landed on the wrong side of the Scie joined the SSR to help clear Pourville and the high ground - the way home.

Major Andy Law took over the unit and together with the better part of the Bn headed inland.

They made good progress but endured constant fire from MGs mortars, and

riflemen. Radio contact, as usual was poor and the Camerons soon found themselves waiting near the RV and wondering what had become of the Calgary Tanks.

The Germans had not been idle and before long the RV was being attacked with more Germans piling on all the time. The arrival of German direct fire artillery with gunshields to which the Camerons had no answer for without working radios or their own mortars meant it was time to go. To add to the urgency the code word was heard meaning get out now !

The fighting withdrawal went well enough and the Navy did their best to pick up the troops from the beach. It was a 200 yard run from the seawall to the water under heavy mortar, mg, and rifle fire and that's when the Camerons losses began to mount.

Of the 503 Camerons who started the battle 346 became casualties. Most of the 60 KIA were buried by the German Army with honours in the cemetery at Vertus above Dieppe. 268 returned to England to continue the fight, 103 of whom were wounded. Most of those who returned to England were to return to France to finish the fight that started in Dieppe.

A great deal had been learned or perhaps some old lessons from Gallipoli in 1915 re-learned. The Russians and Americans had a very convincing lesson as to just how ill-prepared the Western Allies were to open a Second Front at this time. The need for specialized armour for engineers was driven home on the main beaches at Dieppe where none of the engineers made it across the fire swept esplanade to blow a gap for the Calgary Tanks to get off of the esplanade and on their way to the Camerons. The need to bring some sort of port facilities along with the invaders was driven home. The need for serious fire support and not just the guns from destroyers was driven home to the planners and the Royal Navy.

And the 4 ring ENIGMA machine ? Well only Ian Fleming of James Bond fame knew for sure.

Rev. MacDonald, ladies and gentlemen, thank you for your time this morning. Camerons of the Dieppe Raid and onwards, we thank you for your sacrifices.

Hello,

My name is Bill Russell and I live in Vancouver.

My grand-father was with the 43rd. Camerons during WW1. He was in the pipe-band under Pipe Major John Duke. He was also there when a benefactor gave the 43rd. 16 sets of bag-pipes....the pipers, after some controversy at the end of the war, were allowed to keep their pipes.

I will have to check as I am not sure.....he always had scores of stories and his memory was intact right to the end and I think he had a story of each piper and several for P/M Duke. His pipes (#14) were taken overseas for WW2 by my father and landed in Europe on day 2 of the Normandy Invasion and again in 1958 when my father was Pipe Major of the RCAF pipe-band in Marville, France....

During my career as a piper I ran into a few sets of Cameron Pipes since they were so distinctive.....Duke's pipes (who had the only set that was fully engraved) came to the Coast via the Ironsides family in Seattle and recent inquiries on them were that the adopted son of Ironsides had some issues and they were "pawned" somewhere in the US within the last 10 years or so).....very unfortunate!

My Dad joined the RCAF in the 50's and was Pipe Major of one of RCAF Pipe Bands (Marville) and they ended up back in Europe for a third time 1958-1962 and of course saw lots of service again under more peaceful circumstances. It was during the family being stationed in France that my grandparents came to visit and we returned to all the places that the Camerons had been during his service....the stories he told were amazing. My grandfather had been gassed to some extent during the war and there was a legacy of that.....he became Pipe Major of the Calgary Highlanders and on the eve of departure overseas he became ill and nearly died at the Col. Belcher Hospital in Calgary....as much as he tried they never let him re-join the band in Europe and ended up with the Army Police and POW's from the war that were held in detention somewhere in Alberta...but as mentioned the pipes were taken by my Dad anyway and were played at different areas during WW2 in several places.

At any rate....going thru some "stuff" recently I came across his original Plaid which he wore on parade in WW1....a few moth nips but still very good condition....also have 2 framed pics which hung in his house for his whole life..

1) WW1 Pipe Band picture....taken as I recall in London.....right up to the end he could name every piper.

2) Framed picture of the 43rd pipe band marching in the Lord Mayor's Parade at the end of WW1 in London (England)

I am wondering if the Regiment would be interested in these artifacts for your museum or such.
